Did You Know That......

Hundreds of years ago, thousands of gannets and roseate terns nested and thrived on Gannet Rock, Strawberry Island, and many other parts of the Tusket Islands? The Mi'kmaw elders spoke of *clouds* of these birds inhabiting these islands off Southwest Nova Scotia.

The local Acadian Métis population, including Le Bas de Tousquet (Wedgeport) and Pombcoup (Pubnico), were quick to learn from their Mi'kmaw friends of an annual spring delicacy, and traveled by small boat to these nesting islands to collect the eggs for feasting at home. The Métis also learned from the Indians that this yearly cull was not a problem for the birds, because within a few weeks of losing their eggs, the nesting pairs would lay another brood. Unfortunately, colonists not familiar with the ancient knowledge of the Mi'kmaw (who practised sustainable harvesting long before there was a name for it) became greedy for this delicacy, and returned to the Islands to collect the new broods, too.

The result was a decimation of the nesting bird population within a few short years, and to this day, the Tusket Islands remain virtually void of gannet and roseate tern nests.

Anguille à Petite-Eau (Simmered Eel)

Eels 1 or 2 1 or 2 ½ cup Flour 125ml 2 Tbsp Butter 30ml Salt and pepper 1Tbsp Salted herbs 15ml 1cup Water 250ml

Skin, clean and wash the eels. Cut them into 2 "/ 5cm pieces, and roll them in flour. Place the eels and the butter in a heavy frying pan and fry until they are brown. Season with salt, pepper and salted herbs.

Add the water to the pan, cover and simmer for 45 mins, adding more water if necessary.

Serve with boiled potatoes.

Statistics Canada Census 2006

It seems the pride of our heritage continues to grow, as a greater and greater number of us self-identify as Métis-first nation.

According to the information in the 2006 Census, there was an increase of an amazing 730 percent of respondents in Nova Scotia who declared themselves as Métis over the numbers of the previous census. Why is this important? Because the amount of power and influence any group has in any political or societal arena is directly influence by the number of individuals in that group. If we want to be heard, we must have a loud enough voice, and if our membership numbers increase at anywhere near the rate of Acadians now officially recognizing their Métis ancestry – we cannot be ignored.

As we challenge hunting/fishing legislations here in NS as well as across Canada, we will need everyone to do their part – starting with self identifying themselves, whenever asked, as Métis. This gives the various individuals and councils who are presently before the courts the proof that Métis heritage is indeed alive and well throughout the country, and not –as some Crown Attorneys would have the Judges believe – a footnote in past Canadian history.

Did You Know That...

The Acadian manner of naming someone by their father and grandfather, ie. Joseph á Eddie á Emilien, was taken from the local Mi'kmaw tradition. This is not a French custom done in France or Quebec, nor a Métis custom elsewhere in Canada – only the Acadian Métis have carried on the practice of identifying a person by their ancestry, and it gives us further proof that we are a distinct society.
