## Vice-president's Report: MNOC AGA

I would like to thank AAMS President Joseph Jacquard, the AAMS Board of Directors and AAMS Membership for bestowing upon me the privilege of attending the Métis Nation of Canada (MNOC) Annual General Assembly (AGA) and presenting this report in your name. I am humbled.

I attended the five-hour MNOC AGA on 14 July 2019 at Douglas Street Recreation Center in Truro NS. Leading the AGA was Karole Dumont, MNOC National Chief; and, also included: Randy Roach (Highlands Métis Nation Chief); Shane Savoury (Bras d'Or Lake/Unama'ki Chief); Della Spears-Horne (Eastern Shore Métis Nation Chief); Arnold Dithurbide (MNOC Ambassador Nova Scotia); Albert Chiasson (Métis Nation of Saint John N.B. Chief); three invited guests from groups in New-Brunswick and Nova Scotia and myself. AAMS was invited because we are part of the Nova Scotia Métis Alliance (NSMA). There were ten people present at the assembly.

Overall, this was a unifying event meant to foster stronger alliances with its treaty partners and a way to showcase the great work the MNOC has been doing. They brought these people together to create alliances and hopefully forge new friendship treaties with maritime groups. I felt welcomed/wanted.

Some of the topics discussed were: Maritime groups taking over the First Métis People of Canada (CFMPC); National Park Passes should be offered to Métis; MNOC structural changes around elections; 2020 Metis Youth Cultural Camp; and, 2020 Art & Culture Show. Two members brought up issues; one was an illegal fishing (Clam Case) court case and the other was grant applications. It was agreed that all groups share grant application resources and research. I have filed a 10-page report with AAMS Board of Directors.

It was an honour to represent AAMS at the MNOC AGA and file this report.
