President's Report

Did you know?

Native Americans had a planting technique where they would plant corn, beans and squash in close proximity. The corn provides a structure for the beans to climb, the beans provide nitrogen to the soil and the squash plants provide ground cover to minimize weeds. Such a crop arrangement is known as "The Three Sisters".

The Métis sash serves as more than just a symbol of the Métis peoples, but was also a vital part of the fur trade. The finger-woven cloth was an important piece of equipment, serving as a tumpline across the forehead for hauling heavy loads or as the equivalent of a weight belt, preventing hernias. It could also be used as a saddle blanket, wash cloth, rope, first aid kit, and emergency sewing kit with the end fringes used as thread.
